Marianne D. van de Wetering from the Netherlands, with her paper 'Prophylactic Antibiotics for Preventing Early Central Venous Catheter Gram-Positive Infections in Oncology Patients: a Cochrane Review'. Our local Surgical representative, dr. Yasser Saad Eldin, organized a splendid social program. One of the highlights was the post-meeting trip to Alexandria with a visit to the modern version of its ancient library.

Minutes of the IPSO Business Meeting - Cairo, Egypt, Oct 9, 2003

18 IPSO members were present; Apologies: Ray Fitzgerald, Robert Carachi

Agenda

1. **Opening** at 13:30 PM

2. The President informed the membership that due to a communication problem, the AGM could not have been held at the allotted time at the start of the meeting, since the members were not informed. It will be tried to discuss all agenda points in half an hour.

3. <u>Election of the nominees for the Executive Council (replacement of Robert Carachi</u>). The nominees were introduced and a written ballot was performed. Alessandro <u>Inserra</u> (Italy) was elected (Inserra 12 votes, Ikeda 6).

4. **<u>Report from the Treasurer</u>**. The state of Finances was outlined by the Treasurer and accepted by the membership. The Treasurer urged the membership to pay their dues, and will contact non-payers on an individual basis to get their financial situation clear. <u>Squire</u> asked if the financial situation of IPSO now made sponsorships to attend the IPSO meeting possible. This will be evaluated by the Treasurer.

5. <u>**Re-election of EC members**</u> Daniel <u>Aronson</u> was re-elected a second term as secretary (3 years), and Jan <u>Godzinsky</u> was re-elected a second term as member of the EC (2 years).

6. <u>**The selection process of the President Elect**</u> was outlined by the President. Prior to the January newsletter the current President will invite the submission of nominees by the EC for the position of President-elect. If none are forthcoming the current President with advice from the active past presidents will provide at least one candidate. The name(s) of this(these) nominee(s) will be published in the January newsletter together with a call for nominees from the membership. Nominees for the position of President-elect coming from the membership must be submitted to the EC two months prior to the meeting. The EC will determine if all candidates are active members in good standing with the treasurer, and all candidates must have agreed to stand for election. The intents of this process is to be fully democratic and transparent.

7. <u>Election of the President Elect</u> – Hélène <u>Martelli</u> was elected 'President-elect' by acclamation and was congratulated by the President.

8. <u>Election of new Members</u>. The new Applicants for the IPSO membership (Marc HWA <u>Wijnen</u>, MD - NL, and Frans HJM <u>van der Staak</u>, MD - NL) were introduced by one of their sponsors Hugo <u>Heij</u>, and accepted as members by the membership.

9. <u>Recruitment of new IPSO members</u>. The importance to increase the IPSO membership was outlined by the President. Talks have been started with the EC of SIOP to discuss the option of either reduced fares for the SIOP meetings, or the option to register for two IPSO days only (limited registration) for IPSO members. This way it could become of more interest for someone to become an IPSO member. Other options were discussed by the AGM, like contacting potential members at oncology meetings, or at future meetings like APSA or EUPSA.

10. **Future Oncology Meetings**. Information and dates for two future meetings were given (IPSO/APSA 2004 - IPSO at EUPSA 2005). An Oncology course for trainees, as well as an oncology session for Pediatric Surgeons will be included in the EUPSA meetings.

11. <u>MPO becomes PBC</u> (Pediatric Blood and Cancer); future relations. There has been a meeting of IPSO with the new Editor of PBC, Dr. Arcecci. The visibility of IPSO as one of the participating associations (Logo) was guaranteed, and our worry of dilution of surgical oncology and solid tumors by the 'fluid tumors' and benign hematology was expressed and discussed. It was stressed that there will be surgeons on the Editorial Board. But most important of all, surgeons have to submit papers! Interest exists in good review articles.

12. **WFSOS: withdrawal of subscription**. The EC felt that we do not have a great deal in common with WFSOS. We do not derive anything useful from the subscription. We spend money that seems mostly spent on their glossy newsletter. The membership was informed by the decision by the EC to withdraw, there were no objections.

13. <u>Any other business</u>: no other business

14. **The Minutes of the IPSO meeting 2002 (Porto)** were accepted without change, and were signed off by the President.

15. The meeting was closed at 14:10 PM
